

### **Learning Exploration: Rivers and Reformers**

Rivers form a vital part of ecosystems and economic structures throughout the world. Having previously learnt about Australia, children will now pull this knowledge through into the Summer Term and use it to help them learn about an important Australian river, the River Darling. As part of this learning, they need to understand the importance of rivers to human life in terms of economics and trade, and this learning in Year 2 will form the basis of their understanding of trade and interdependence as they move up through the school. There is no doubt that children today benefit from the hard work and bravery of reformers through history, and Year 2 will move on to learn about two of the most famous women who have changed the lives of others by contributing to national and international achievements. This will hook back to their learning about the local philanthropist William Rock, as well as give them a strong basis for their learning in KS2 where they will further their learning of how to become a citizen who can contribute to their world.

#### **Hook into learning:**

Pupils will begin their journey through this Learning Exploration by having the opportunity to create their own rivers in the Go Wild area of the school site.

# Journey through the exploration

Continuing to build on our geography learning about Australia, we will explore the River Darling before finding out about how rivers flow, exploring the questions: How do rivers flow? Do rivers ever travel uphill? We will develop our geographical vocabulary to describe and explain the features of rivers. We will also build on our statistics skills to use data to find out about trade globally and locally.

We will then move on to finding out about important social reformers including Emily Davison and Rosa Parks. We will consider the significant impact these people have had on history and our lives today. We will explore the idea of fairness and social justice, hooking back to our work on philanthropy in the Spring term.


Children will explore the following genres of writing: Non-fiction:
