Learning Exploration: Groovy Greeks

There is no doubt that the discoveries of Ancient Greeks still affect the world todayeven in the UK. Looking back at Ancient Greece explores the origins of democracy, philosophy, literature, and the arts. The topic promotes cultural diversity, fostering respect for different customs and beliefs. It enhances language and literacy skills through exposure to ancient Greek vocabulary, myths, and literature.

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Ancient Greece connects with various subjects, encouraging interdisciplinary learning in history, geography, art, and mathematics. Additionally, it imparts life lessons on perseverance, heroism, courage, and democratic values. By delving into this fascinating civilization, children develop curiosity, critical thinking, and an appreciation for their cultural heritage.

Hook into learning:

Children will experience a 'Greek Day' where they can come to school dressed up as an Ancient Greek. They will have a chance to learn about the Greek Gods, the different city states that vied for power and try some Greek food.

Journey through the exploration

This Learning Exploration will give children the opportunity to answer the following questions:

- How do we know about the Ancient Greeks?
- What is the difference between a civilisation and an empire?
- Why were the Greek states so different from one another? Why did they disagree so much?
- How have the ancient Greeks influenced our society today?
- What is democracy and equality?
